The three-acre farm provides job training, leadership development and education in gardening, the food system, and nutrition. Each summer the program accepts 12-18 crew members, ages 14-18 years from primarily low-income backgrounds. The crew plants, cares for and harvests diverse vegetable crops, learning while they work. Activities, field trips, cooking classes, and guest speakers enhance the educational component. The majority of the harvested produce is donated to FOOD for Lane County and the rest is sold at an on-site farm stand that the crew learns to run.
