A call to the Crisis Response Program connects to a crisis worker, who will provide referrals and assistance to help stabilize the situation, restore safety to the home and create a short-term plan. If more intensive intervention is needed, and the worker believes an on-site intervention is warranted and with parental permission, a Crisis Response Team will come to the home. Response is provided 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, throughout Lane County.

Direction Service Assessment and Evaluation Center

Provides psychological evaluations, assessment of intellectual functioning, personality assessment, assessment of anxiety, including post traumatic stress disorder and obsessive compulsive disorder, assessment for depression, academic assessments, including learning disability, attention-deficit/hyperactivity disorder and attention-deficit disorder. Referrals may include people who are difficult to diagnose, who appear to have more than one mental health diagnosis, who are seeking assistance in understanding difficulties they might experience at work or at school, who are looking for an independent evaluation related to special education.

Northwest Youth Corps

Northwest Youth Corps is a youth development, outdoor education, and leadership training program. The participants work on conservation, reforestation and recreation projects in the Northwest. Some programs focus locally within the state of Oregon, while others travel throughout the surrounding states. Programs include: Youth Grow (ages 7-11), a day camp; Teens-n-Trails (ages 14-15); Youth Corps (ages 14-19). Tuition fees vary by program and limited tuition assistance is available.
